MOTHER TERESA

Mother Teresa was born on August 27, 1910 in Skopje, Macedonia. Her original name was Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu. The youngest of the children born to Nikola and Drane Bojaxhiu, her father was a successful merchant and she was youngest of the three siblings. She received her First Communion at the age of five and a half and was confirmed in November 1916. From the day of her First Holy Communion, a love for souls was within her. Her father's sudden death when Gonxha was about eight years old left the family in financial straits. Drane raised her children firmly and lovingly, greatly influencing her daughter's character and vocation. Gonxha's religious formation was further assisted by the vibrant Jesuit parish of the Sacred Heart in which she was much involved. At the age of 12, she decided that she wanted to be a missionary and spread the love of Christ. At the age of 18 she left her parental home in Skopje and joined the Sisters of Loreto, an Irish community of nuns with missions in India. There she received the name Sister Mary Teresa after St. Thérèse of Lisieux.

After a few months of training at the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Dublin Mother Teresa came to India on 6 January 1929. On May 24, 1931, she took her initial vows as a nun. From 1931 to 1948, she taught geography and catechism at St. Mary's High School in Calcutta. On 24 May 1937, she made her Final Profession of Vows, becoming, as she said, the "spouse of Jesus" for "all eternity." From that time on she was called Mother Teresa. She continued teaching at St. Mary's and in 1944 became the school's principal. A person of profound prayer and deep love for her religious sisters and her students, Mother Teresa's twenty years in Loreto were filled with profound happiness. Noted for her charity, unselfishness and courage, her capacity for hard work and a natural talent for organization, she lived out her consecration to Jesus, in the midst of her companions, with fidelity and joy.

On 10 September 1946 Mother Teresa got a call from Jesus to abandon teaching and to work in the slums of Calcutta. In January 1948 she got the permission to leave Loreto convent and to work for the unwanted, the unloved and the uncared. In 1957 she started the religious congregation for sisters called the Missionaries of Charity. Mother Teresa has received 124 awards and the important among them include the following.

The whole of Mother Teresa's life and labour bore witness to the joy of loving, the greatness and dignity of every human person, the value of little things done faithfully and with love, and the surpassing worth of friendship with God. On March 13, 1997, Mother Teresa stepped down from the head of Missionaries of Charity. She died on September 5, 1997, just 9 days after her 87th birthday. She was given the honour of a state funeral by the Government of India and her body was buried in the Mother House of the Missionaries of Charity. Her tomb quickly became a place of pilgrimage and prayer for people of all faiths, rich and poor alike. Mother Teresa left a testament of unshakable faith, invincible hope and extraordinary charity. Her response to Jesus' plea, "Come, be My light," made her a Missionary of Charity, a "mother to the poor," a symbol of compassion to the world, and a living witness to the thirsting love of God. Following Mother Teresa's death, the Holy See began the process of her canonisation. In 2002 Vatican recognized a miracle through which an Indian woman Monica Besra was cured of abdominal tumor through the intercession of Mother Teresa. On 19 October 2003 she was beatified by Pope John Paul II. On 17 Decemer 2015 Pope Francis recognized a second miracle through her intercession. It was healing of a Belgian man named Marcilio Andrino who was in coma due to a viral brain infection. On 4 September 2016 Pope Francis declared Mother Teresa a Saint.



ST. KURIAKOSE ELIAS CHAVARA CMI

(1805 - 1871)

Founder, C.M.I Congregation

St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara C.M.I was a Catholic priest in Kerala. He was a saint and a great reformer of the Church and the society. He started the first Sanskrit school at Mannanam in 1846. He was the root cause of tremendous growth of education in Kerala. He started schools and gave education to all including girls and dalits. He is the first Indian dared to admit untouchables to schools, and provided them Sanskrit education that was forbidden to lower casts. He started the first school and boarding for girls in 1868. As the Vicar General in Kerala he insisted in 1864 that schools should be opened attached to churches. Then many schools were opened and thus schools came to be called Pallikudams (schools attached to Palli). He encouraged learning English, which was generally discouraged. He introduced midday meal to poor students and to support it introduced the pidiyari scheme. (families setting apart a handful of rice every day to feed the poor). Thus he took special initiative for the education of girls and dalits. Thus Fr Chavara revolutionalised the education sector of Kerala. Following the example of St.Chavara the C.M.I congregation started a number of educational institutions in India and now it has a large net work of educational institutions including play schools, schools, colleges, professional colleges and schools for the mentally challenged.

St. Chavara is the founder of CMI congregation for men and C.M.C congregation for sisters. He started the first old age home. He started the first printing press by the Church. He himself was a good writer and has written many books.

Fr. Chavara is the first male Catholic Saint of Indian origin. He was declared a saint on 23 November 2014 by Pope Francis.

DISCIPLINARY RULES OF THE COLLEGE

The students are hereby instructed to observe the disciplinary rules strictly. No student is expected to plead that he/she is unaware of the existing disciplinary rules. Ignorance of rules has no excuse.

- ❖ The students should be regular and punctual in attendance. Late comers shall be permitted to attend further sessions only after the ratification of genuine reason by the authority.
- ❖ The Morning assembly begins with a prayer song followed by readings from the Holy Books of Bible, Bhagavat Geetha and Quran. Important news of the day are announced in the Assembly and a thought for the day is given and they are followed by patriotic song. The Assembly ends with singing of the National Anthem.
- ❖ Students, teachers and administrative staff should wish each other.
- ❖ Crowding on the varanda, door way and shouting etc. will be treated as act of indiscipline.
- ❖ Students are expected to keep silence responsibly.
- ❖ Students shall behave with modesty and dignity both inside and outside the campus.
- ❖ During free periods, students shall either use library or engage in useful independent work.
- ❖ Students shall keep classroom and college premises neat and tidy.
- ❖ The students should always wear identity card.
- ❖ Students should wear college uniform as directed by authorities. Boys shall not be found with tuck up dhoti, unbuttoned shirts, low waist pants and T shirts in the college. Girls are instructed to use two uniforms : One Saree and one Churidar as per the decision of the staff council.

- ❖ Activities of party politics are strictly prohibited inside the college campus. As per high court order on writ appeal No.535/2003 and judgement on review petition dated 20th Feb 2004 all strikes, demonstration, agitation, dharna gharao and like are banned in the college campus. Students who violate the above rules are liable to be dismissed from the college.
- ❖ Banners, flags, posters etc. shall not be allowed inside the campus and at the gate for the purpose of any activity without the permission of the Principal.
- ❖ No external involvement will be allowed in the affairs of the college.
- ❖ All sorts of intoxicating substances are strictly prohibited.
- ❖ Except parents and guardians any outsider to the college will be permitted only with the prior permission of the principal
- ❖ Prior written permission from principal is required for the following activities.
 - ❖ 1. For organizing procession, any meeting, entertainment or special function in the college.
 - ❖ 2. Collecting any sort of funds from the students or from the staff and from the public.
 - ❖ 3. Distributing notice or putting up any matter on the notice board.
 - ❖ 4. Programmes arranged by Associations and Clubs and outing of any type conducted by students.
- ❖ Any indecent behaviour from the part of students inside or outside the college will be considered as misconduct and may lead to further disciplinary actions.
- ❖ Students shall not cause any loss, damage or defile any of the college properties. Such loss will proceed to recovery.

- ❖ The use of mobile phone is strictly prohibited inside the college as per Govt. Order .Offenders will be levied fine and the mobile phone will be confiscated.
- ❖ Conduct certificate at the end of the course is not taken for granted. The decision of the Principal shall be final regarding this matter.
- ❖ The student shall not indulge in Ragging or in any other activity causing physical or mental harassment or difficulties to the co-students in the college. Any student involving in a such activities will have to face penal proceedings in accordance with the provision in the Ragging Prohibition Act of the Govt. of Kerala.
- ❖ The Principal reserves the right to reject any admission to any student without assigning any reason.
- ❖ Students are forbidden from entering the Laboratory except with consent of the teacher incharge.
- ❖ No student shall appear for an interview or examination without prior permission of the principal.
- ❖ Cinematic dance and Fashion show shall not be allowed inside the college campus.
- ❖ Fees once remitted will not be refunded in any case.
- ❖ 3rd January will be celebrated as Founders Day of the CMI congregation.
- ❖ Any other issue which is not covered in this will be decided according to need by the Principal or the authority of the college.

❖ **Delayed tuition fee payment after 30 days of the first working day of each academic year lead to statutory actions as per the University / Government Acts and rules.**

RULES OF ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

1. Students are not permitted to absent themselves without leave letter. Application for leave in the prescribed form should be submitted sufficiently earlier.
2. Absence for 14 consecutive working days will be considered sufficient reason for removal of student's name from the rolls.
3. Leave may be granted for not more than 10 days at a stretch including holidays. In the case of unavoidable reasons (illness etc.) additional leave may be given on producing certificates from a registered medical practitioner.
4. A student shall be considered to have satisfactory attendance to appear the examination if he/she attends not less than 80% for all theory classes, course work, practicum and 90% for internship.
5. Condonation of shortage of attendance shall be as per existing University rules. Candidates with shortage of attendance beyond the condonable limit will not be eligible to register for the end semester University examination. In such cases the candidate has to repeat the course by taking re-admission from the University.
6. Absence from class test or examination without convincing reasons will be treated as breach of discipline.

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COLLEGE LIBRARY

1. The college has a well equipped library.
2. The library is open to all students and members of the staff of the college.
3. The library will be kept open on working days from 9.00 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. and it will be closed on Sundays and all recognised holidays.
4. Identity card issued by the college should be produced at the counter before entering the library.
5. Personal articles like books, bags, umbrella, files etc. should be kept at the entrance assigned for this purpose, before entering the library.
6. Strict silence must be observed in the library.
7. Library books are divided into :-
 - a) Reference Books
 - b) Lending BooksBooks from Reference Section will not be allowed to be taken out of library except with the written authorization of the Principal.
8. Students can borrow books from the library. Two books will be issued to a student at a time and they may not be retained by the student for more than 7 days. But can be renewed for further period of 5 days if there is no demand for it from any other student.
10. A fine of Rs.2/- for each book per day will be levied for delay in returning books. No further books will be issued to the student till he/she pays the fine.
11. Absence from the college will not be admitted as an excuse for delay in returning books. Fine is applicable for the same.

12. Periodicals or magazines will not be lent out to students.
13. The librarian or Principal may recall a book at any time even when the normal period of lending is not over.
14. The student must satisfy himself or herself as to whether the book issued to him / her is in a good condition and if it is not, bring the matter to the notice of the Librarian. For all damages to books noticed at the time of return, the borrower will be held responsible and he/she will have to pay the cost as per the stipulation of the college.
15. If a book is lost or damaged, the borrower must replace the book or pay the estimated cost of replacement and the fine as per rules from time to time.

If the book is not available in the market 2 times the face value of the book should be paid.

16. Students shall not write upon, damage or make any mark upon any book, manuscript or magazine or periodicals, belonging to the library.
17. Hall Ticket, for the university examination will be issued only after clearing all dues of the Library.
18. Books should not be sublet on any account to anybody.
19. Two books may be taken out for the Onam and Christmas holidays. All such books should be returned not later than the second working day after the reopening of the college.
20. Any other issue which is not mentined here will be decided by the Librarian in consultation with Principal or authority of the college.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE HOSTEL STUDENTS

1. No admission of friends or relatives is granted to the hostel without prior permission of principal.
2. Written Permission from the Principal is must for going out for purchase, going home or to any place other than college. In case of emergencies permission will be granted by the building owner and at the same time information must be given to principal. On return they shall inform the principal.
3. Students shall be in the house by 6:30 p.m.
4. House given for rent and the adjacent premises shall be kept clean and neat by the students.
5. Any complaint or suggestion regarding food and convenience shall be informed only to the principal and not to the house owner.
6. Waste Management must be done according to the instruction of the house owner.
7. Mobile phone should not be used after 10:00 p.m.
8. At least two students must be in the hostel, if all are not going home or elsewhere.
9. The students should keep their belongings at their own responsibility.
10. Further instructions and regulations will be made by the principal whenever it is necessary.

College Council

RESOURCES AND SERVICES

College Library

The students have access to the college library which has sufficient number of books and periodicals on the subjects and other related fields as specified by the NCTE. It has got a good collection of general books and books on education. Magazines and Newspapers are available to enhance the general reading of the users.

Computer Lab

As the new B.Ed Curriculum of Calicut University gives importance to the teaching and learning of ICT, a well equipped computer lab with internet facility is provided in the college for the use of staff and students. The students can take advantage of the full time internet access during working hours for enriching their knowledge.

Laboratories

The college is well equipped with laboratory for Psychology, Educational Technology, Language Learning, Science and Computers.

Physical Education

The students are given opportunities to handle physical education classes and also to understand things connected with the organisation and administration of sports. Facilities have been provided for sports and games such as foot ball, volley ball, cricket, chess, shuttle badminton and athletics.
